The state of the Holy Souls after Death - De statu animarum post mortem

While the afterlife activities of the saints (whose feast is Nov. 1) are not in dispute, questions about the eschatological state of all souls after death (commemorated on Nov. 2) have always been raised. In the Apostles' Creed, we profess that Jesus "was crucified, died and was buried; He descended into hell..."! That means that Jesus went to the realm of the dead after His death before His resurrection – not to suffer, but to free the righteous souls who had died before Him. There He proclaimed the gospel to them too, and granted them to experience victory over death.

Every year on this feast commemorating all souls, the Church encourages us to remember to pray for all our beloved dead. The souls of the departed are benefited by human efforts. These benefits are mostly obtained by the prayers and offerings of the living on behalf of the departed in the holy Mass. Eustratius of Constantinople, referencing writings of Early Church Fathers, wrote that

by these efforts, "'they are changing' not to [a life] of the dead, but 'to a life [filled with God] and they are placed in the holy commemorations,' and they are present with the choir of saints and are 'inseparably...joined with' Christ" (Eustratios, *De statu animarum post mortem, translator uncertain*).

In our Gospel text for this Sunday, Luke 7:11-17, Jesus meets a funeral procession at the gate of Nain. Everyone's prayer is to be lucky to meet the Lord when they die. Jesus touches the dead man and gives him life. Jesus reverses death and sorrow by giving life and to both the man and, indirectly, to his mother. This event in the Gospel of Luke explicitly shows that Jesus is "the one who is to come," the Messiah, who was promised in the Old Testament. He comes to change even the most frustrating, miserable, and difficult situations that make humans weep. He is Lord of Life, and Lord over death.


